Finding it difficult to choose a guidebook when planning your visit to Scotland's biggest city? Christine McGyver, a freelance travel writer, takes her pick of the best guidebooks currently available on the market.

Guidebook A: Written in a casual and familiar tone by the same authors who put together *What's On in Glasgow* magazine, this valuable guidebook had a lot to offer. Besides being up to date with all the coolest happenings in the city, it is also concise enough for those planning to stay just a few days, covering all areas of interest in a condensed and easy-to-read way. If a trip to Glasgow is in your future, this is the most handy book to take with you. Available both online and printed form.

Guidebook B: One of the best-known names in the business, aimed at young, independent backpackers and InterRailers. Some of the information is somehow poor for such a regularly updated publication. However, it covers all significant points of interest, includes a wide range of sights and venues and hints on what to do when it's raining! Perfect for packing and easy referencing, and definitely weighted towards entertainment and nightlife. A must for 20-something partygoers.

Guidebook C: a brand new series of local guides, best-suited for those who want to discover Glasgow's gems. Packed with a diverse range of things to see and do, highlighting everything that visitors simply cannot afford to miss, including well-drawn maps, this guidebook is particularly handy for travellers with plenty of time on their hands. It includes every building or monument in the city and it also covers all types of restaurants, including several that cater for vegetarians, vegans and people with food allergies, encouraging all of them to go out and give them a try.

Guidebook D: Not a guidebook in the traditional sense, this very stylish, full color *art piece* aimed at 'sophisticated travellers' will surprise you with its 3D cutaway drawings of the buildings and main sights of the city, diagrams and photos of food, costumes and signs, combined with amazing bird's-eye-view itineraries - rather than traditional maps. It's quite pricey (47£) but well worth a look when you visit a bookshop.

Guidebook E: High-quality holiday? No admission charges? Yes, we can! This comprehensive, yet compact book lists an amazing range of places which cost nothing to visit. It should pay more attention to some beautiful churches, such as Glasgow Cathedral and Necropolis and St Andrew's Church, but otherwise this is a must for seriously budget-conscious travellers. Written by an anonymous backpacker in 2011, this 96-page book isn't quite free, but at only 3.99£ it's not far off it. Buy it online now!
